


# Ecology Club Members Stock the "Quitty"!



They were painted in the theme: *Adapting to a Changing Climate*

### Students Learn About the Dangers of Vaping and Smoking

Dr. Mandy J. Harshberger, RRT, WellSpan Good Samaritan Hospital Pulmonary Services Operations Manager and Roxanne Burkholder, B.S., RRT WellSpan, Ephrata Hospital Pulmonary Servicers Operations Manager presented a PowerPoint on respiratory care, vaping, and educational requirements to become a respiratory therapist to Mrs. Jackson's and Mrs. Lewis's eighth grade Health classes on March 23, 2023. Eighth grade students were taught about the dangers of vaping and smoking by utilizing pig lungs as an interactive and visual warning. The black-colored lungs, shown in the pictures, were directly treated with chemicals found in common tobacco products, mimicking the damage caused by smoking a pack of cigarettes a day for a year. Students found out that when air was added to the black-colored lungs, they barely inflated and appeared to have very little elasticity, which was not like the pink lungs when inflated. They filled up like a balloon and then returned to original size According to the CDC there is an outbreak of lung injury associated with the use of e-cigarette, or vaping, products. 




### **NLHS Student Council Students Represent!**

### NL FFA Students Participate in Eastern Regional Speaking Contest





### Fourth Grade Students Participate in Stream Study!

From May 15th -18th the Northern Lebanon 4th graders participated in a district-wide stream study at Levitz Park and Memorial Lake State Park. Throughout the day students were immersed in an inquiry-based investigation on the relationship between watersheds, water quality, and macroinvertebrates. To start off the day students learned about macroinvertebrates, specifically indicator species, and how the lack of or abundance of certain species reflects the health of the water in a certain area. After the presentation on commonly found species, the eager 4th graders donned boots and gathered buckets, d-frame nets, kick nets, along with their sense of adventure and headed intro the streams. Each day Mayflies, Dobsonflies, Caddisflies, Crane flies, Water Pennies, and Dragonflies were safely harvested (and later returned) for student

observation and identification. After the harvest, the species were placed into observation stations and the young scientists tallied the number of each species found. At the close of the day, each group reported on the types of species they were able to harvest and identify. Based on our findings, we calculated the biotic index for the stream. Our score showed the sampled areas were of excellent water quality! Great job, 4th graders! A special thank you to Levitz Park for hosting, Ms. Ronda Sowers and Mrs. Mardelle Bouchette for instructing and guiding the students, NL Administration for the support of this program, and all the high school group leaders for being role models to our young Vikings. Without your help, the week in the stream would not be possible.






### **Popcorn Hat Theater**


### Fredericksburg Students Countdown to New Beginnings!

### The Final Curtain Call

In the lifetime of an average human-being, a decade is a pretty significant amount of time. Ten years ago, in the spring of 2013, four classroom teachers, a gym teacher, and a technology director decided to follow some of their roots from their elementary school experiences and put together a rock band for the kids. Thus, FredROCKSburg, the band, was created. The initial goal of the band was to have a fun, positive assembly of celebration for our students. It worked!

In the days leading up to the first assembly, the concert signs and rumblings amongst the kids created a sense of anticipation that you could feel in the hallways of our humble school. Unbeknownst to the members of the band, the assembly jumpstarted a drive that only pushed Fredericksburg Elementary to become even more of a kid-focused school that not only provided educational opportunities but focused on providing numerous activities that would reach the whole child.

On June 2, the last day of the 2022-2023 school year, there was one last performance in Fredericksburg Elementary, a building that has synonymously become known as FredROCKSburg. Before the curtain closed, there were songs to sing along with like *Sweet Caroline* and *Livin'* on a *Prayer*.

There was the highly-popular student air guitar competition! The band played dance songs that brought out some of the best dance moves in both students and staff alike! And, without question, some boisterous rock songs were played that tested the strength of the gym walls that were erected in 1963.

A short documentary video titled, *FredROCKSburg: A Decade of Dominance (2013-2023)* was played for all to see and enjoy! It included pictures of activities that have taken place in the past ten years of performances. This included videos portraying silly, fictitious training and recruiting processes that were used to join the band, along with teacher Olympics and singing groups that included the female teachers of the school. Air guitar competitions and Christmas singalongs, that included Grandma Herling getting chased by two reindeer, were also remembered fondly throughout the video!

While some people say that all good things must come to an end, FredROCKSburg does not. FredROCKSburg can still remain in our memories. Its ideals can live on forever in both our daily lives and even in new environments that we encounter.


### Time Capsule FUN!

In 1963 the staff and students of Fredericksburg Elementary buried a time capsule filled with various documents and objects with the intent of providing a glimpse into 1960s school culture for the future historians who would find it. Just over 40 years later in 2004, the Fredericksburg Elementary building was renovated, adding additional classroom and hallway space, so the time capsule was excavated and more contents were added. Now in 2023, 60 years after the capsule was first buried, all classes are preparing to move to the newly constructed Northern Lebanon Elementary School. In preparation, the capsule was once again exhumed so that its contents could be examined.

Unfortunately, the welding of the capsule did not completely hold against the elements, so some of the materials were exposed to rain and had become waterlogged. The lucky staff members who opened the capsule and sifted through the contents reported a pungent smell that followed wherever the materials were taken, which became the topic of conversation for many of the staff members who visited the office that day. Thankfully all of the items are still readable!

### **Examples of the contents from 1963:**

- A commencement program for the 1963 graduating class of Northern Lebanon High School.
- A number of 1960s postage stamps attached to a school letter.
- An issue of the Belron, the school's student-run newspaper, dated September 1963.
- An issue of the Lebanon Daily News, dated September 30, 1963. Some headlines mention John F. Kennedy, Nikita Khrushchev, and the recently introduced polio vaccine.
- Class lists of all students and teachers who attended Fredericksburg Elementary.
- A small bag containing one of each US coin minted in 1963.
- A horseshoe with a note explaining that it was found by a second grader.



### Examples of the contents from 2004:

- A letter addressed to "Fredericksburg Historian" from Kenneth Weaver, the Fredericksburg Elementary principal at the time.
- A 2003-2004 Northern Lebanon school calendar.
- A book created by the 1st grade class titled "The Life of a First Grader in 2004".
- A list of favorite books from each 2nd grade student
- A list of favorite things from 3rd graders such as songs, places to eat, and school subjects, and a program of a play they wrote titled "Actions Speak Louder Than Words".
- A CD that contained a PowerPoint file with every 4th grade student's answers to the question "If you could only put 3 items in a time capsule, what would they be?"
- A book of student-created photo collages made up of pictures of things that 5th graders felt were important to them.
- A student-created newspaper called "The Sixth Grade Review", with articles written by 6th grade students. Some headlines included the 2004 US presidential election and NASA's Mars rovers.








# Students Raise Money for the PTO! VIKING PRIDE




