NL Drama Club Draws the Curtain and Presents "Holes"!



After the brief tour, students immediately took to work and began weighing donated food, adding up totals, and documenting every item that was donated. Those items included the numerous cans of food and

















non-perishable items that the middle school students themselves offered to bring in and donate.

Mrs. Arnold was thankful to have the assistance of the eager group of students because volunteers are an integral part of how the organization works. Students divided into groups and worked efficiently to sort non-perishable food items, canned goods, checked for secure packages such as double-checking food quality dates, and freshness, and sorting items into categories. Students also worked on stocking the shelves and assembling food boxes/ bags for distribution

The work that the students did was an incredibly meaningful experience. So much so, that many of them inquired about how they could personally come back and volunteer after school hours and even in the summer! Pumpkin Day Celebrated at Fredericksburg Elementary!

Pumpkins, pumpkins all around! October 26th is National Pumpkin Day. One of the best things about fall is that there are pumpkins everywhere, making it easy to have a pumpkin day complete with some science exploration! First grade wrote about pumpkins, tasted treats that were baked with pumpkin, studied the life cycle of a pumpkin and explored parts of a pumpkin using their five senses. The first graders explored questions such as, "How does it feel?" or "What does it smell like?" to develop oral language, communication, and vocabulary. There was some math learning related to pumpkins too. We estimated and counted the pumpkin seeds, put



pumpkins in order from smallest to largest and used different math tools to measure our pumpkins. Finally, our pumpkin study led us to a discussion of decomposition. We read a story called "Pumpkin Jack" and continue to check on what decomposing pumpkins look like over time to support our learning about decomposition.











Favorite Book Characters Come to Life at Fredericksburg Elementary!

On October 28, Fredericksburg students were able to dress up as their favorite book characters and take part in activities to explore character traits. The event included a voting by members of the entire student body on the best storybook character costumes. The joy of seeing book characters "come to life" was truly contagious.
