## NL Alumnus Shares Adventure in Ecuador

NL graduate Daymon Long (class of 2014) returned to his alma mater on December 21 as a guest speaker for high school Spanish and Video Editing classes. Daymon recently graduated from Point Park University in Pittsburgh with a degree in cinema arts (a semester early, he points out, thanks to his coursework at NL). During his time at Point Park, Daymon had the unique opportunity to travel to the remote village of Curingue, Ecuador to follow the Pittsburgh chapter of Engineers Without Borders. His assignment was to create a short film about their humanitarian efforts in the South American country. The finished product is being used by the organization to raise further funding for their project, which is bringing potable water to remote villages in Ecuador. Currently women in the villages have to hike for several hours up and down mountains to transport water to their homes.


Daymon answered student questions and shared stories about the experience, which included a lot of hiking at high altitudes, fighting a serious stomach bug, being mistaken for CNN, and eating potatoes for every meal. Daymon shared with students that he used his 3 years of Spanish at NL to help match up translated scripts to the speakers in the film, in order to create accurate subtitles. He encouraged students to continue to study Spanish, and mentioned that he wished he had continued to further his own language study. He reminded students to be thankful for the simple privilege of running water. He also challenged students to travel, to set their sights high and to pursue lofty goals.




## NL Shows the Love



## TO SPACE AND BEYOND!



Students in all four district elementary schools had the opportunity to experience a mobile planetarium during their library class with Mrs. Kortright to learn about Greek and Native American constellations. The students were given an oration of the history and stars that make up the constellations they viewed while inside the planetarium. Also, students at East Hanover Elementary School had a chance to travel to Jupiter on the Juno Spacecraft, see the National Monuments in Washington, D.C., Mount



Rushmore, Statue of Liberty, and the San Diego Zoo all by using Virtual Reality Google Expedition glasses. ### Technology and First Grade by Mrs. Showalter

The lessons each week are set up to help girls gain confidence in themselves. At the end of the 10 weeks, we will all be participating in a 5K race at Hershey Park together! Many other Girls on the Run teams from all over the area will be there to join us!

As a team if we can help each girl realize their limitless potential and show her how she is free to pursue her dreams, then we have truly done our job! Girls on the Run is so much more than an exercise program; there are many core values that will be taught throughout this 10-week program (see below). This is the first year that we have been able to offer this program at Fredericksburg, but we were pleasantly surprised with the amount of interest we had! 



